GIVE GENEROUSLY!

A concerned father asks, "When do I explain to the kids what is happening to their mom? How much do I say? How will they ever understand?"

Mike and Cheryl have two children. Their daughter, Liz, is 8 and their son, Ryan, is 10 years old. Liz plays piano and Ryan skateboards. They are busy, delightful, thriving kids with lives full of school, friends and soccer. Mike works full time. Cheryl had been at home to manage the household, chauffer the kids and volunteer at school. She organized the social engagements and did the laundry, always with a vibrant energy and good nature. There was harmony to the home. Two years ago, however, Cheryl became uncharacteristically distant, less affectionate and chronically angry. She appeared lethargic, with little energy or exuberance. That, combined with physical restlessness, convinced Mike that HD had taken up residence, despite Cheryl's denial of any problem. At first, the kids were simply confused. They couldn't understand why mommy often yelled and wasn't always happy when they arrived home from school. But there were still enough good days for Mike to just say that mommy was having a hard day. But the hard days became more frequent.

Now, after two years, Mike reports the kids have learned to avoid mommy, or to fear her if they have not completed their chores. They sometimes make a mess, are loud and silly and they resent the chores that seem more demanding than those of their friends. They just want to be kids. They ask why mommy sits on the couch so much and why she doesn't have dinner parties anymore? Why doesn't she play, why doesn't she volunteer in the school garden and why doesn't she drive on field trips? And why is she so angry with them?

Mike is grieving for the wife and partner he is slowly losing. And one of the most painful aspects for Mike is watching his children respond to the changes in their mom.

A recent large-scale study at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center examined families coping with the illness and loss of a parent. The report clarified a child's grieving process from ages 3 to 17 years, and made it very clear that children are incredibly resilient; they can grow and recover, but much of a child's strength comes from the responses and support of the unaffected parent.

Particularly with an illness such as HD, the grieving and loss is extended over years. It is a process, continually changing as the relationship with the ill parent changes. In the Sloan-Kettering study, the age of the child defined understanding and coping. The 3-5 year olds had a difficult time understanding the irreversibility of loss. They needed very concrete explanations, and they often demonstrated distress through nightmares, stomach aches, bedwetting, and extreme anxiety when separated from the well parent. Children ages 6-8 years could understand permanent changes, but they were often likely to feel responsible for their parent's illness. They loved talking about their affected parent, telling stories about the parent, and they cherished special shared memories. The 9-14 year olds were more reluctant to talk about their loss; they escaped into their activities and friends. The 12-14 year old adolescents could be shockingly egocentric, worried more about how the illness of the parent would affect social lives. But they also missed the ill parent terribly, as a caretaker and as a roll model. The oldest children, from 15 to 17 years, most resembled adults in their approach to loss. They were helpful and supportive to the well parent, but clearly experienced a sustained grieving.

The study emphasized that children who adjusted most appropriately did so because their parent(s) communicated with them. When there was no communication, or the well parent was terribly burdened by his/her own depression or the children additional stresses. simply experienced difficulty coping. more Interestingly, many ill parents expressed concern that their children would remember only the most difficult stages of their disease, and most often, that was not the case. Children's images " focused on the positive aspects of the parent."

A few basic guidelines:

Answer the question asked honestly and directly, without offering more than is needed. Make sure that you understand WHAT is being asked. Simple, reassuring answers are most effective. Your children are sensitive to the changes in their home. Their fantasies and magical thoughts may have created horrifying answers already; your words can soothe and make sense to them. Remember, there is time to offer information gradually – incremental explanations over time can be modified according to maturity of the child and symptoms of the parent. Your children may benefit from counseling, particularly as they get older and may need a safe place to express their fears, sadness, and anger. The older child will likely need more in-depth discussion, with tolerance for a spectrum of unpredictable emotional responses. Remember, the adolescent is a complex array of contradictions.

Use appropriate resources. An overwhelmed parent will be perceived as inaccessible – let other trusted adult's help. Allow your children to be kids. Helping with chores is great, but keep tasks age appropriate, with time for homework and PLAY. Home should not feel like boot camp. Kids with loving, accessible parents and/or trusted adults can understand and adjust to incredible hardship. Their questions keep them connected to you. Don't shut them out, don't overwhelm them – aim for balance, simplicity and honesty. Be accessible. Be genuine.
